Restoration News

Six Tucson community leaders started nonprofit Patronato San Xavier in 1978 with the sole purpose to preserve and restore Mission San Xavier Del Bac. So much has been accomplished and our work continues because so many of you now share their vision for this beautiful, historic church; one of the most recognized buildings in Arizona.

Conserving the Altar Railings

After two seasons of work, the cleaning and restoration of the Retablo Mayor (the high altar) is complete and our interior conservation team has turned its attention to the ornate balustrades that surround the main altar. This will be the first restoration of these wooden railings that have stood in place for more than 200 years.

Part of original elements of the church, the balustrades still show signs of the painted decoration that once adorned them. Over the centuries, the wood has been seriously damaged by termites, so the team will carefully clean and inject epoxy to build up missing elements and stabilize the wood. They also will make saw cuts near the base and treat the soil underneath to prevent further infestation and create a barrier to prevent moisture being drawn up into the wood and causing more damage.


Underneath the East Tower

Danny Morales and his crew introduced fiberglass reinforcement to mitigate against earthquake damage as they secured the foundations to bedrock beneath the East Tower. We're pleased to report that after months of work, this foundational work on the East Tower is complete.



Invitations. In past years, we mailed almost 1,500 of our signature concert invitations at the beginning of October. Each invitation is hand-assembled and, with postage, we spend almost \$4 per invitation. We know some of our

supporters love the beautiful invitation and for many, its arrival defines the beginning of the Christmas season. What did we do? The "Friends of Patronato" was born and now, for an individual donation of \$50 (\$75 per couple) received within each calendar year, you are a "Friend of Patronato" and the traditional invitation arrives before the post card invitation. You get a jump on purchasing your tickets online or by

phone. Post card recipients are offered online ticketing only.

Premium Seating. Everybody hopes for a best seat at the concerts. In the past, seats have been allocated on a "first come-first serve" basis. Last year, we experimented with a new approach: pay a little extra to receive a premium seat. It worked; we sold almost 300 premium seats. This year, we will add the opportunity to select a preferred chapel section to premium seating. The balance of seat assignments continues to be managed by the date requests are received.

No need for two performance choices. Our new ticketing process allows you to submit just your first choice. Many people told us their second option anyway, so we needed to circle back to confirm their first preference. One choice saves us time.

Online ticket sales. We sold more than half of our tickets online last year, allowing important information to flow straight into our database and accounting system. It also allows the confirmation and tax receipt to be sent automatically. For our small office, this saves a huge amount of time.

IRAs + Charitable Giving

IRAs (individual retirement accounts) and charitable giving is a topic in which many of our readers expressed interest. Here's a synopsis from philanthropy expert Clyde Kunz.

Everyone who set up and contributed to an IRA during their working years are obliged to begin withdrawals from these accounts after the of age 70. Many IRAs were set up so that the tax was deferred; in other words, taxes would be paid at the time the funds were withdrawn.



A Challenge. For those who have other sources of income, these required IRA withdrawals are not needed, yet IRA account holders are obliged to take the money and pay the taxes anyway.

A Solution. You can choose to give these dollars free of the tax obligation directly to a 501(c)(3) nonprofit such as Patronato. In other words, you paid no tax when you invested the money, and you'll incur no taxes when the money is gifted to a charity.

For this type of charitable gift to qualify free of the tax obligation, you need to instruct the manager of your IRA account to make a gift directly to the charitable entity of your choice. You cannot withdraw the money yourself, deposit the funds into your bank account, and then write a check for the gift because the IRS applies taxes when you personally withdraw funds, regardless of what you do with those funds.

Clyde also makes it very clear that if you plan to leave gifts to a charity after you have provided for your family through your estate plan, IRA funds are the obvious ones to donate for similar reasons. When the charity of choice is named as beneficiary of IRA accounts, the money transfers tax free. If an IRA transfers to a family member, it can create a sizable tax burden for that family member in the year the bequest is received.
