A New Mission Statement for Patronato

This Spring, members of the Board approved a new mission statement for our organization. A central concern was the original statement's emphasis on Patronato's "only purpose" which effectively ignored the educational components provided through our docent programming and the more research-based approach to conservation that increasingly defines Patronato's work. Also, the original statement included the term "restoration" which in the world of preservation architecture, has a very specific meaning. Members of the Wa:k community also expressed their belief that locating the Mission "near Tucson" rather than in the community of Wa:k negates an important part of the Mission's history. We believe the resulting redrafted mission statement better defines who we are and what we do.

"Patronato San Xavier funds and directs ethical conservation, conducts scientific research, and interprets the significance of Mission San Xavier del Bac, a National Historic Landmark, in the community of Wa:k, part of the Tohono O'odham Nation."

Visit by Grant Partner from Sacred Places

Earlier this year Patronato welcomed Chad Martin, Director of the National Fund for Sacred Places, to Tucson for a two-day site visit. In October 2018, the Fund selected Patronato and the Mission project as one of 13 national projects to receive grant funding. In addition to meeting with parish, board and staff leadership, Chad took an indepth tour of the Mission with particular interest in the East Tower project which will be their funding focus.

FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS:

- The National Fund for Sacred Places will be offering the Patronato a grant of up to \$250,000.
- This year, Patronato is committed to raising \$500,000 to match the maximum grant award of \$250,000.

Large Scaffold inside the Church

Visitors to Mission San Xavier across summer were surprised to find a giant scaffold erected in the West Transept of the Church. This scaffolding provided our conservators access to the domes and upper reaches of the transept. It has been nearly thirty years since a team of conservators from Europe (having just wrapped up projects at the Sistine Chapel) initiated the first conservation efforts in this section of the Church.

Our conservators have been carrying out deferred maintenance. Temperature extremes within the Church cause damage to the fragile painted surfaces requiring new evaluation. Gaps where the plaster had separated behind the painted surfaces were carefully filled. Loose paint fragments were painstakingly re-adhered.

The West Nave Door



In one quiet corner, the conservators discovered a dove's nest with a single egg! St Francis would appreciate the "White Dove" continues to be a refuge for all.

This Spring the first and most seriously impacted of the doors in the main church will be removed for conservation treatment by wood conservator, Luke Addington. (You may remember Luke's work on the conservation of the altar railings and the 18th Century beams in the Museum Rooms.) The doors are all original to the church and have never received comprehensive preservation. In the case of the West Nave door, the jambs have been severely damaged by termites, so that they no longer support the hinge hardware. These jambs will need to be removed and rebuilt, conserving as much of the original wood as possible. The goal of this work is not to make the door "like new" but rather to clean and stabilize the materials, protecting the wood from further deterioration. This way the originals can continue to serve their purpose for another 200 years.

Maintenance on the Domes

A building as complex as Mission San Xavier and subject to some of the world's harshest climate extremes, needs continual maintenance. Up on the roof, the protective layers of plaster develop fine cracks due to movement within the building. Routine maintenance must be carried out every other year; repairing the cracks and applying fresh coats of the traditional lime plaster. This year, on sections of the roof where damage is most extreme, new conservation techniques to address the cracking are being tested. Working with techniques used in other settings, our conservation experts are testing non-traditional materials in the cracks to create greater elasticity. Such trials need to ensure that nothing is attempted that cannot be reversed. The goal is to see if these approaches might extend the maintenance cycle by preventing the cracking occurring so quickly. Whatever the outcome, Patronato's findings will be shared with peer organizations, building upon our intent to serve as a resource partner to a global conservation community.



San Xavier Inspired Art: An Art Auction to Promote and Preserve

Friends of Western Art held a live auction at the Mountain Oyster Club on October 12 to benefit Patronato. Twentyfive renowned artists produced and donated art that was sold to support the conservation of the fragile artwork in the Mission interior. Event proceeds raised \$50,000 to support this vital work.

Patronato's Docent Training

Last fall, 15 new Docents graduated training to bring our Docent Group to a total of 70 active members. And, it could not have come at a better time! During high season, October through April, tours are offered to the public every 30 minutes, up to 10 times a day, with over 35,000 visitors annually taking a *complimentary* Docent-led tour. To cope with anticipated growth in tour numbers, a new training class began last month.

If you haven't taken one of our Docent-led tours of the Mission, they provide excellent information about the history, art and architecture of Mission San Xavier. Docent-led Tours are offered year-round, every day (except Sundays and dates reserved by the Parish for weddings, funerals and special Masses). For cultural and academic groups of more than 15 individuals, we can arrange a Special Tour. Complete the "Group Tour Request" form on our website and allow us a minimum of two weeks notice to set up these Special Tours.

It has been a busy year! On March 1st we hosted Grammy-winning Christian Music Pioneer, John Michael Talbot who performed at St. Thomas the Apostle Church to support conservation activities. At the end of the March, Tenor Carlos Zapien headlined Patronato's Spring Concert at San Xavier performing *An Evening of Spanish Bolero*.

In August our Docent educators hosted a workshop for teachers. Mission culture is part of several State Standards in the K-8 curriculum. 35 elementary and secondary teachers attended to learn more about San Xavier and how to plan tours at Mission San Xavier.

The beginning of October we launched our new Friends of Patronato Lecture Series. Lectures take place monthly, October to March and feature members of our Speakers Bureau who address a range of Missionrelated topics. The lectures are free to our *Friends of Patronato* or, for guests, there is a small charge.

October 16th saw Dr. John P. Schaefer, former President of the University of Arizona, present a lecture at the Center for Creative Photography discussing his relationship with photographer Ansel Adams and sharing images of their respective take on the Mission's architecture.
